## From the College Board

Mandurah Baptist College Board is skills based. Members are committed Christians with a strong desire to fulfil the oversight of the College with good governance principles to achieve our mission. The Board has worked harmoniously with the Principals and executive staff during the year achieving some significant milestones.

### College Organisational Restructure

During 2023 the Board implemented a decision flagged to the College community prior to Covid 19. It was announced that from the commencement of 2024 the College would have one Principal leading the whole College. A transparent nationwide search was carried out for the new Principal. The successful applicant was Mr Matthew (Matt) Dusci, which is a credit to the College's leadership development program.

During the last half of 2023 Mr Dusci worked closely with the Board to develop a new whole of College structure and appoint staff to new positions. The Board is grateful to Mr Dusci and all staff for their cooperation in the process and adjustments that have been made.

The Board especially thank Rob Gratton, the Foundation Principal of the Primary School for his contribution in seeking the best future for the college.

### Master Plan

The Board spent most of 2023 working with Mr Dusci and staff planning for Stages 3 and 4 of the Master Plan.

Stage 3 includes a new soccer oval, additional car parking and a new Primary School playground. This commenced at the end of Term 4. Stage 4 includes eight classrooms, a toilet block, maintenance shed and new basketball courts.

### Finances

The College Annual Finance Report is included as part of this Annual Report. It is of note that the College is in a healthy financial position. Once again, the Board is thankful for the hard work of the College's highly skilled and dedicated finance team led by Pieter Conradie.

### General

The Board continues to work with the Principal and staff to provide the opportunity for each student to achieve to the best of their ability in the areas they choose to study. We fully understand and support the increasing number of ways available for students to achieve entrance to university, a tertiary institution or employment of their choice.

The College is successful because of the unified team effort involving the administration and grounds staff, teaching and support staff, students, their families and the Board. It is only as we work together that we can achieve Mandurah Baptist College's mission: "To provide an excellent education in a Christian context, developing life-ready students who reflect the character of Jesus Christ."

### From the Principal

Mandurah Baptist College enjoyed another fantastic year of learning and growth throughout 2023. Jampacked with thought-provoking, engaging learning every day, supplemented by enriching experiences for our students and some amazing community events, the College continued to provide meaningful experiences beyond the standard curriculum.

Highlights of the year included a highly successful Parent Connect Seminar with guest presenter Maggie Dent, another outstanding Open Night Learning Journey, an amazing Primary School Musical Theatre Production of 'Robin and the Sherwood Hoodies', the introduction of the Global Leadership Summit Next Gen program (with an exceptional training day for Year 6 student leaders run by our Year 10 and 11 student leaders), our senior girls' team achieving a silver medal at the Australian Schools Volleyball Cup and much, much more.

The use of data for school improvement remains a strong focus of the College, and we were pleased to note that our College data during 2023 again reflected the efficacy of our teaching and learning programs. While a change in NAPLAN timing meant that comparing datasets to previous NAPLAN testing periods was not possible, the College was pleased that analysis of our data, particularly at higher year levels and where students have been at the College for longer, remains strong. Our Year 12 OLNA completion rate was at its highest ever, and our WACE completion rate was at its highest level since the introduction of the revised WACE requirements in 2016. ATAR results were also pleasing, with the year's median score being the second highest in the College's history. 2024 sees the College entering a new era, with a new, K-12 College structure now in place, and planning for a Pre Kindergarten program and expanded Secondary School underway.

Planning for capital works to support the expansion and development of the College was a key feature of 2023, with plans in place now to complete both Stages 3 and 4 of the College's Master Plan during 2024 – another exciting addition to the facilities of the College, in service of our mission and our community.

Thank you as always to all of our wonderful College Board, staff, students, parents, guardians and community for your support over this year. We have a very special community here at MBC, and it is a delight and privilege to be involved with it each day.

### Management of non-attendance

- Teachers mark the attendance register twice daily in the Primary School and in every class during the day in the Secondary School. Correspondence received explaining student absences is recorded on the student's profile.
- Text messages are sent daily to parents if no contact has been made with the school. Replies to daily text messages explaining student absences are recorded on the student's profile.
- If no explanation for an absence has been received from the Parent/Guardian follow-up contact via email is sent to parents: for Primary, at the end of each week and again at the end of each term and for Secondary, at the end of each 5 week period and again at the end of each term.
- Students who have failed to attend (without notification) after three days are personally followed up with a phone call from the Receptionist/Student Services Officer.
- A small number of compulsory events are required by students as part of the MBC community. Attendance is taken at these events.
- Regular attendance reports are provided to the Principals in Primary and Secondary at the end of each semester.

In Primary, teachers report attendance concerns to the Principal, who will meet with a parent/guardian. In Secondary, Heads of Year and Deputy Principals are given fortnightly updates from Student Services of students with low attendance. Contact is made with a parent/guardian of any student who is identified as having an attendance percentage that puts them at risk.

Out of 23 subjects:


- 'School Moderated Mean' six subjects above state

One student received a Certificate of Distinction and eight students received Certificates of Merit.

37% of students completed one or more VET qualifications during Year 11 to 12.

The Secondary School is very proud of the students' individual progress and recognises students who achieve at a high level annually. Senior students (Years 11-12) who achieve over 80% for assessments are acknowledged with a Club 80 certificate, and in 2023, 1617 certificates were issued. Additionally, a total of 23 Certificates of Academic Merit, Distinction or High Distinction were given out across both semesters for students who achieved at least 2 grades at an 'A' level in a WACE course throughout the year. In the Lower School (Years 7-10) a total of 63 Certificates of Academic Merit, Distinction or High Distinction were given out across both semesters to students who achieved at least 5 grades at 'A' level.

### Secondary Education

Students are eligible to achieve their WACE through a combination of courses and programs delivered wholly at the College, in conjunction with the College or via college partnerships with a continually growing number of external providers. Courses completed outside of the College are supported by administration and management from within the College.







### **Community Satisfaction**


